2ND REGIONAL MULTI-STAKEHOLDER (RMG) MEETING IN BUDAPEST



National Healthcare Service Centre (NHSC), organised the 2nd Regional Multi-Stakeholder Group meeting (RMG) 5th December 2017, in Budapest. One of the major tasks of the NHSC is to ensure efficient implementation of the project by utilising the R+D+I knowledge and experience having acquired by the RMG members, and incorporate them into the results of the project. The Hungarian RMG has a serious input in giving an opinion on policy recommendations and consulting technical papers and reports, elaborated in the framework of the project, as well as providing professional representation at international workshops. The 2nd RMG meeting aimed to give an account on achieved progress so far in the Hocare project, and provided an overview of policy recommendations under elaboration. These recommendations aim to increase effectiveness and to modify national public funding schemes or financial instruments. Participants of the meeting consisted of representatives of end-users, businesses, research actors and public authorities, as stakeholders of homecare innovation, in accordance with the Quadruple Helix approach.

During the meeting all the 3 thematic studies, focusing on the 3 main themes of the Hocare project were reviewed and examined how innovation can be supported if it is: 1.built on unmet needs; 2.public driven; 3.bringing innovative solutions faster to market.

Country specific observations of the 3 studies, which are related to the innovative ecosystem and to the most important challenges offered by the financial schemes of the OP (EDIOP), were also discussed with stakeholders. This was followed by a review of the foreign GP-s received from the

project partners in order to examine which Good Practices could be transferable for Hungary. One of the main aspects was if a given GP served cooperation in innovation or provided solutions to improve effectiveness and efficiency. Another important element to consider was whether the result of the given innovative cooperation could be partly or fully rapidly applied in Hungary, with some minor developments. Finally, the first draft of policy recommendations were reviewed, which had incorporated conclusions drawn both from collected GP-s and from Thematic Studies prepared in the project.

HOCARE NATIONAL POLICY LEARNING EVENT IN HUNGARY



5th December, 2017, National Policy Learning Event was organized by NHSC in Budapest, with the participation of national patient organisations, health care experts of primary care institutions, representatives of the business sector (industry & distributors) universities & researchers, various ministries and authorities responsible for the relevant development policy fields. The event aimed to provide an overview of project results having achieved so far, as well as to share and discuss potential and already identified policy recommendations and challenges, based on the collected transferrable international GP-s.

Audience of the PLE Forum was greeted by **Dr. Márta Ladányi** Deputy State Secretary for Health Care Coordination, Ministry of Human Capacities, who underlined the exceptional importance of home care and residential nursing in Hungary, where every fifth citizen is over the age of sixty, and emphasized that improving the quality of and access to primary care, and within that to increase the role of residential & home care services are crucial. Dr. Ladányi stated that Home care had already become and independent service area where technical innovations highly assist patient care and contribute to the dissemination and take up of standardised tele- and e healthcare services. Dr- Ladányi also welcomed the European GP-s collected within the Hocare project, which are related to concerted development of systemic, technological innovation, as well as generating innovative services & care.

Mr. Ferenc Tipold, Head of Department for Planning and Territorial Development, from the Ministry of National Economy, highlighted how the current operational programmes and financial schemes contribute to the development of networking and cooperation among sectors of the quadruple helix model, and can boost competitiveness. He said there would be a possibility to move forward in this field, following a due assessment of the policy recommendations prepared by transnational programmes like INTERREG EUROPE projects, and mentioned the HoCare project as a good example for fostering successful implementation of regional & national strategies, and support schemes by way of its international cooperation.

On behalf of the organiser, **Dr. Miklós Gondos**, Regional Director of Central Hungary Region of NHSC, welcomed participants of the event. As a representative of a maintainer institution he underlined importance of improvement access to quality care, and mitigating the shortage of specialist staff. He urged providers' (institutions and expert staffs') more active participation in the innovation processes in order to improve efficiency and enable sustainability of the care system. For this reason he stressed significance of the HoCare project, which is in identifying and collecting such European GP-s, both related to healthcare and health industry that contain a great number of already tried & tested innovative solutions, products, procedures or services, providing transferable and adaptable solution models, which following some necessary modifications can be adopted by the local systems of the respective partner countries.

Greetings were followed by a review of selected GP-s and an interactive debate, during which we received useful comments and inputs. The opinions/recommendations coming from various organizations/bodies concerned in health innovations, development policy, and patients' advocacy will be built into the national Action Plan, the completion of which will be the next milestone of the project.

HOCARE 3rd REGIONAL MULTI-STAKEHOLDER MEETING IN BUDAPEST



The 3rd meeting of the HoCare Regional Multi-Stakeholder Group (RMG), which supports professional implementation of the project, was organised by NHSC on 8th February 2018. The

event took place in the conference room of NHSC' headquarter and aimed to have a common debate and discussion with members of the RMG on the thematic reports, which are currently under elaboration based on the Thematic Studies covering the main themes of the Hocare project (unmet needs; public driven innovation; and bringing innovative solutions quicker to the market related to home care) and will assist implementation of transferable selected Good Practices in Hungary. During the meeting we reviewed the situation in Hungary, the current challenges we are facing, and the transferable GP-s Hungary could adapt, with special regard to the field of bringing innovations quicker to the market. Following that we outlined the action plan that would be completed by the middle of March. We used SWOT analysis In order to model potential transfer/adaptation of selected GP-s and had an interactive debate on possible scenarios, as well as overviewed and assessed recommendations, which would be incorporated in the finalised action plan.
